

For attention of GP practices: <u>Fifth</u> vaccine dose for blood cancer patients

The covid vaccine schedule for blood cancer patients has been:

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1<sup>st</sup> primary dose – from around Jan 2021
2<sup>nd</sup> primary dose – from around April 2021
3<sup>rd</sup> primary dose – from around September 2021
4<sup>th</sup> dose (1<sup>st</sup> booster) – from around January 2022
5<sup>th</sup> dose (2<sup>nd</sup> booster/Spring booster) – from around April 2022
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Anyone aged 12 and above who has blood cancer, or is immunosuppressed, should now get their Spring booster. This should be their fifth dose.

If someone has had fewer than five doses, and it's been three months since their previous dose, they should have another.

Due to communication problems between the NHS and GPs, many people with blood cancer have not had their correct number of doses yet. This has left people unprotected from covid, in a group that are most at risk of death.

Blood cancers include:

- Leukaemia
- Lymphoma
- Myeloma
- MDS (myelodysplastic syndrome)
- MPN (myeloproliferative neoplasms)
- Essential thrombocythaemia (ET)
- Polycythaemia vera (PV)
- Myelofibrosis

Those with slow-growing or chronic blood cancers should also get the fifth dose, even if they are not on active treatment. So should people in remission, if they still have immunosuppression.
